



MY FAMILY'S TRIP TO NEW ZEALAND

On our recent trip to New Zealand in January 1998 my husband (Adrian), daughter (Jessica) and I came across some lovely fern areas. One in particular stays embedded in my mind, as it reminded me of the movie "Against the Wind".

We had a campervan and didn't plan on staying in a Caravan Park until we came across a sign saying "Caravan Park with 5 acres Natural Bush Setting" near Woodville.

Our campervan developed a mind of its own, somehow the brakes were applied and the next thing we were heading towards the Hawera Caravan Park. entering we couldn't see any bush setting, so went in search of someone to help us. Apparently it was hidden behind a row of hedges.

In the park itself, trees were covered from top to bottom with Pyrrosia eleagnifolia (Leather Leaf Fern). It was so lush and green, I thought if only I could grow it this well at home in Wodonga (Victoria). I can now only fantasize about in in our fernery, unfortunately.

It was getting quite late in the evening, so we decided to just have a very quick look at the Natural Bush Setting, leaving Jessica back at the van waiting for her tea, and take our time the next morning to take photos and videos.

We passed through these very old iron gates. Upon entering, you could feel this eerie feeling. It was just on dusk and with dappled sunlight which gave us a feeling of eerieness, yet we wanted to explore. There were lots of different pathways to follow and I didn't want to miss anything.

Ferns were abundant up trees and on the forest floor. Here is what we found:

(Hen and Chicken) Asplenium bulbiferum nearly 4 feet (120cm) high, clumps of them, all covered with bulbils. A 'must have' in any garden.

with Asplenium polyodon (Mares-Tail) fronds also 4 feet long. One of my favourite ferns.

Asplenium oblongifolium (Shining Spleenwort) 2 metres round and looking so lustrous, huge clumps everywhere as you turned every corner.

Blechnum fluviatile (Ray Water Fern). Blechnum?

Phymatosorus scandens erywhere on tree branches, even on the ground in large

(Fragrant Fern) Ev-

clumps, this is another favourite of mine, doing quite well in a hanging basket in my fernery.

Phymatosorus diversifolium (Kangaroo Fern). Growing on the trees and along the ground, so lush. We've tried training it up a tree fern trunk, but with no luck. Seems to want to grow in the opposite direction. The shovel will show it the right direction shortly!

Leptopteris hymenophylloides (Single Crepe) Only upon entering in the first ten minutes. I thought I might find L. superba here but luck wasn't with me.

What an astonishing garden! Yes, I did say 'garden' as it had lots of wonderful garden plants; perfect, deepest blue and whitest of white hydrangeas (huge plants with enormous flower heads), aspidistra, ivy, palms and many more, too many to mention. There were also bulbs of all sorts scattered throughout.

As we left the perimeter of the park to move to the centre we just couldn't believe our eyes, as we came across a mammoth pond with a three tier fountain all in disrepair and very overgrown. I just stood there and imagined it many years ago with the water flowing over the edges of the fountain, and all the wildlife about, wild ducks and maybe a pair of black swans, with eels and goldfish in the bottom of the pond with colourful waterlilies floating on the water's surface and sunlight just peeping through the trees, giving a glistening shine on the water. Then I came back to realitly and saw a garden that once was. The former pond was empty, but in its day would have been a great spectacle.

Upon leaving this area it brought back memories of watching 'Against the Wind', thinking of the beautiful mansion Tara which could be around the next bend. Sadly it wasn't so onward we went, finding more ferns. Large branches that had fallen down to the forest floor were covered with Pyrrosia eleagnifolia, Asplenium polyodon, Phymatosorus scandens and Asplenium bulbiferum. This was a sad sight to see as I could have seen it growing in a section of our fernery, if only we could buy these sorts of specimens back home in Wodonga.

Looking at our watch, we found that we had been in there a very long time, between two and three hours, while poor Jessica was still waiting for tea - it was 9 o'clock! We hurried back only to get told off, "I didn't think you were ever coming back," she said. It gets dark very late over in N.Z. - so much for a quick look that night.


If I were you, this is one place I would put on my list to visit. New Zealand is a majestic place and I can't wait to

USING PERMINE

Keith Hutchinson told us a bit about the use of perlite at our May meeting, and a discussion ensued. Someone asked what it was made of and variously gypsum and plaster were mentioned. My Collins dictionary says that it is "a vitreous rock, such as obsidian, whose mass seems to be made up of enamel-like spheroids". There you are.

Perlite can be used as an additive to your potting mix. It is particularly useful in Winter because it lightens the mix and aerates it. If anything it is slightly alkaline but most ferns will tolerate it well and Maidenhairs love it. It is quite reasonably priced - in Victoria a big bag is about \$15.

It is best to lightly moisten perlite before you use it as the dust that rises from the dry product can get in your throat. Although Keith doesn't think it will hurt you, the effect is very uncomfortable and is best avoided. It also mixes through the potting medium much more easily when damp.

When learning about how to store dahlia tubers over Winter some years ago, we were told that 100% perlite is just the thing to pack them in. Even though we moistened it slightly, it soon dried out and we lost most of our stock as they appeared to be simply desiccated. Maybe it was the pH, though. Either way, I remember being pretty impressed! The lesson; LEARN HOW to use garden Thanks to both of you. -Lyn. products properly.

July's 5 Minute Fern Talk

Osmunda vachellii

I was at an Orchid Society meeting recently and was horrified. A man who grows lovely Miltonia orchids said they did best grown in rockwool, but he'd had to give it away because all the ferns kept growing in it and he'd had to weed them!!!

My subject tonight is a plant I thought was Osmunda regalis but the label says O. vachellii.

I had it growing in a polyhouse. I don't know why I decided it needed heat but I did. During that time the spores began midway up the fronds and went right to the tip. Once the spores come there is no sign of any leaf matter, only these curly things, which are the sporangia. They look a bit like catkins from a silver birch tree. While the Osmunda was in the polyhouse, every frond had this fertile part.

I got disgusted with the look of it and put it out on the bottom shelf of the fernery - and for the last four years it has not had any fertile fronds. I've obviously offended it!

I've got another one called, O. regalis 'Purpurascens' which has a quite different frond. Its spores are arranged much more neatly and there is often a pinnule at the end of the fertile bit. Then I found one which is supposed to have red spore (O. cinnamomea?) and then a couple that are supposed to live in Zimbabwe.

By that time I was completely confused, as I couldn't find anything very helpful in my fern reference books. Maybe someone can help me?

Ian suggested that it was not terribly happy in the better lit spot so thought it had better have some babies before it deceased and when it was moved into a shadier place the low light level suited it so well it relaxed! He also said that most Osmundas are completely deciduous, and that the non-deciduous ones probably suit our conditions better.

He has given up growing O. regalis because it needs continual water seepage and even when he had it going well, after a few weeks in a retail outlet it was all shrivelled up. O. schraederi is almost as bad.

Someone else (couldn't recognise the voice) said that they wouldn't appreciate the cooler conditions so well when moved into the open fernery.

Barry White grows his O. regalis about four feet high - in the fishpond because it is a swamp fern.

On reading up on the Osmunda genus, I find many references to 'wet' and 'boggy' conditions, and also the fact that most are deciduous - good news for us 'cold country' fernists. . . Lyn

Maybe we need a speaker to talk on Osmundas sometime.

June's 5 Minute Fern Talk

Nephrolepis exaltata 'Gretnae'

Presented by John Hodges.

Some years ago the Society went on an overnight trip to Wangaratta/Porepunkah and at Norma's Fern Nursery (not my Norma) up there, Norma and I bought this fern. Well, not this actual one because every couple of years I divide it up and repot it. I now have four or five big pots of healthy, vigorous Gretnae at home.

The main reason I brought it in tonight is that when I do divide it, there are always a few bits which I can give to people. We all like to get something for nothing so it's a good way to get them interested in growing ferns.

I find this fern extremely easy to grow. If I'm out of my normal potting mix I just mix up a few leaves, recycled potting mix and Osmocote or a similar plant food. As for growing tips - I don't have any. It seems to just grow and grow!

Q. Where do you grow it? With shadecloth all around

it and shaded, clear fibreglass over the top. It doesn't like extreme cold eg., under a tree in a cold part of the garden wouldn't suit it at all.

Q. Is it a golden form or is it just poorly? It's a golden form, thank you very much!

Chris Goudey in his "Handbook of Ferns for Australia and New Zealand" says it is a large, weeping fern with crested fronds and forked, bluntly lobed pinnae. He adds that it is a very graceful cultivar.

Barbara Joe Hoshizaki's "Fern Grower's Manual" calls it the Gretna Sword Fern and says it grows medium to large, is cold tender, grows in low to high light and moist to dry (not wet) conditions.

Sounds lovely, and as John said tolerates nearly any conditions.

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
