
CALENDAR OF EVENTS 2008

Due to catering requirements if you are intending to attend this function, and as yet not informed Norma can you please do so on **9878 9585** before the 20th November.




You will need to bring along with you cutlery, plates and a cup, tea and coffee will be supplied, if you require anything else to drink please bring it with you

PRESIDENTIAL PERORATION

Soon after the last Newsletter went out, unfortunately we received the very distressing news that sadly our member (and Committee member) Milton Edwards had passed away following a short illness. Commiserations were conveyed to Wendy and her family on behalf of the Society. Subsequently, we have tried to be of assistance in finding buyers for the large number of ferns that Milton had collected and those he had been raising. Those FSV members who we could contact readily were invited to a sale afternoon early in October; others visited separately; and we also purchased some for FSV for Special Effort prizes at meetings and to on-sell at the Kevin Heinze Centre's Spring Fair. We're hoping that by this time fern retailers introduced by us may have purchased more of the stock. Wendy and her sons are keen to sell as much of the stock as possible before the warm weather arrives as they know that they will be unable to look after the ferns. Any members who may be interested in helping to give them a home should contact any Committee member, and we'll try to set up a mutually suitable time to facilitate this.

Keith Hutchinson (past Committee member and President who continues as a stalwart of the Society) fronted at our September meeting, not long after throat surgery, to show us the wide variety of succulents that he grows and give a most interesting explanation of this group of plants and how to cultivate them. The competition fern category of Pyrrosia also brought in some very nice entries.

Our Open Garden at home on the Grand Final weekend went well, with a small smattering of visitors showing interest in ferns, and two copies of the Ferns DvD sold.

We had another meeting focussing on a subject other than ferns in October, when Colin Cleak brought along some really fine cymbydium orchids and gave a highly entertaining and expert explanation about cymbidiums and how to grow them to perfection. Colin has been growing cymbidiums for only 6 years, but over this time has built up a huge collection and has been successful at capturing first prizes at many shows (including winning national champion awards). He explained that he had achieved his expertise through membership of the Cymbidium Orchid Society, which concentrates its efforts on helping members to learn the practical aspects of growing cymbidiums successfully. Colin also showed us slides of the houses he's built both for his orchids and his ferns, all filled with really nice-looking plants. The fern collection includes numerous large specimens of different Platyceriums, a genus of particular interest to Colin.

With their agreement, we're hoping to arrange a Fern Society visit to Colin and Noelle's home in Nagambie next spring, to give members an opportunity to enjoy their cymbydium and fern collections in person.

We also had a good selection of very nice Blechnums exhibited, and as usual a discussion about these led by Barry White. Thanks to the exhibitors.

The October meeting also incorporated our Annual General Meeting. There being no fresh nominations for Committee, the meeting confirmed all current members to continue on Committee, and likewise all office-bearers. On my own behalf, and those of the other members of Committee, I thank Society members for their continued confidence in us. However, under the Rules of the Society there are several Committee places unfilled at present. We could certainly do with extra participants on Committee to help in the running of the Society. In particular, just at the present we seek a member willing to take on the role of Newsletter Editor. Brenda Girdlestone - who we've been grateful to have as a willing Editor for some time now - has consented to remain a Committee member but foreshadowed that due to the demands of her job she will look to discontinue her role as Editor in the short term.

The Newsletter is vital as our main form of contact with members. We're very keen to hear from any member who would like to consider volunteering to become Newsletter Editor - ideally someone who has a computer with internet access and a good working knowledge of word processing and digital photo handling. Naturally, we'll provide whatever extra training and assistance might be necessary to help a new Editor take control. We also owe thanks to Bernadette (Bernie) Thomson, for again auditing the FSV accounts (and saving us the expense of using an non-member as auditor). Bernie was reappointed as auditor for the current year. However, she's indicated that she would like a rest from the audit, and we'd very much appreciate hearing from any member who might be prepared to take over this task (it's not a really lengthy job, as the accounts are fairly simple as you'd expect - just requires a modest level of book-keeping knowledge).

A few of us staged a FSV stall at the KHC Spring Fair in mid October - it was nice to find some of the patrons asking questions about ferns and buying them. Having not staged Fern Shows for a couple of years (and not intending to do so again in 2009) this sort of event at least provides a small opportunity to promote ferns. We have been in consultation with the Ferny Creek Horticultural Society about the possibility that we may be able to participate in one of the shows they stage each year at their Mount Dandenong garden, which might provide another opportunity of somewhat larger dimensions in the future - involving far less exertion (and also financial risk) than attempting to stage a full-scale show ourselves. In the meantime we owe our gratitude to Norma and John Hodges who are going to "show the flag" for FSV (again) at the Marysville Flower Festival to be held on the weekend of November 1 & 2, taking along two carfulls of their magnificent ferns for the display.

For our next meeting, the focus will be on Adiantums. Chris Goudey will talk about them when we visit Chris and Lorraine Goudey at their home in Lara on Saturday 1st November (details in the upcoming events list). This should be a rewarding and interesting meeting, and we hope lots of members can make it. There'll be no evening meeting for November at the Kevin Heinze Centre, with our only activity there in what's left of 2008 the Christmas lunch on Sunday 7th December. Please don't forget that RSVP for the lunch is required by Norma Hodges by 15th November.

As usual I take this opportunity to wish all those members who we may not see in the period leading up to Christmas and the start of the New Year all the best for the Festive Season. We'll hope to have plenty of members join in our 2009 activities - details of the activities arranged for early 2009 are also provided elsewhere in this Newsletter.

DRYNARIA

A GROWERS POINT OF VIEW

As a keen collector and grower of Drynarias, I've decided to put my procedure and views to paper, whether they be right or wrong, they work for me giving excellent results.

The growing season here in Adelaide appears to begin around the month of October at this time old fronds would be deciduated or browned off and should be removed allowing new growth buds and fronds to progress freely.

During this period I top up my baskets as required, with an epiphytic mix supplemented with one of the following, Dynamic Lifter, Rapid Raiser, Ultraflora 2000 or a similar fertilizer. If the fern needs re□-basketing this is the time to do it, using an epiphytic mix laced with one of the above mentioned fertilizers. I then dunk the ferns in an old tub filled with water, to which I add Fish Emulsion or Nitrosol or similar. The baskets are totally immersed for 10□15 minutes, removed, drained and hung in a well lit position with good air movement.

The ferns should grow on to become a healthy and attractive specimen by mid to late November or early

December with large fronds. Care should be taken when ferns have their new growth, because at this stage the fronds are quite tender and brittle, if mishandled they could snap or break easily.

Mid to late December, the ferns should be flourishing and by now will be quite hardy with some signs of new growth appearing. As January progresses the ferns should be full and well developed, at this time I give a dose of fertilizer, Dynamic Lifter or similar to ensure that they will have enough nourishment to last for the rest of their growing season.

You will find on "well established" ferns that through January to March and at times into April, there could be some new growth appearing. This of course will depend on the climatic conditions at the time. With a late and humid summer there could be astonishing results in growth, but whatever the conditions, from November through to April, you should still be rewarded with **excellent ferns to admire.**

The ferns, I find prefer a well lit position with an Easterly to North Western aspect, although this is not altogether necessary. They require plenty of air circulation and common sense watering and remembering that their habitat is Tropical to Semi Tropical. In nature they can be deluged in the wet season with copious quantities of rain, but being epiphytic they would only retain the amount they require. To simulate these conditions, they should be monitored and watered to suit these requirements. In exceptionally hot weather, this could be twice daily, or a little but often, not heavy watering, but an amount to keep the fern damp.

It should be noted that it is not advisable to excessively water overhead (as we could be prone to do during a hot spell) this tends to weigh down the fronds, causing them to fold or crease, and they will eventually die off.

Drying out over a short period doesn't seem to cause damage, but undue dryness under exceptionally hot conditions could be damaging. Drying out in the winter would be advisable as this is their dormant period, but this should also be monitored.

DRYNARIA

Remember that information gained, whether it be from books, articles or verbally, should be considered, but the knowledge used at the discretion of the grower. Conditions such as position, light, atmospheric conditions, geographical position and growing medium are all important factors this brings into calculation one more condition, the human element. It is up to you as the grower to use your own findings to a certain degree, by trying to simulate the natural requirements of this fern, if you do so and abide by your findings, you can only succeed in growing excellent specimens.

Please remember we cannot duplicate Mother Nature, but we sure can simulate her.

Take note that this is my personal summation for growing these ferns in the Adelaide area, and therefore should be adjusted to suit the individual conditions and requirements of your particular area.

Hoping that this article can be of some assistance with the growing of Drynarias.

My Epiphytic mix for Drynarias

1 part Tree Fern Fibre

1 part Pinebark 10-15mm

1 part Charcoal 10-15mm


1 part Peanut Shells

half part Sphagnum Moss

half part mulched Oak Leaves to which 1 add, of your choice.

Rapid Raiser or Dynamic Lifter or Ultraflora 2000, using your own discretion as to the quantities, as conditions and requirements differ from area to area.

ADIANTUM CAUDATUM

(trailing maidenhair fern)

A tender fern native to tropical regions. It occurs in limestone areas and prefers good drainage. Bulbils form on the tips of mature fronds and if pegged down soon take root to form a new plant. The pendulous habit of this fern makes it ideal for hanging baskets.



FROM THE SHOW BENCH OCTOBER By Don Fuller

The competition category for the October meeting was the genus Blechnum and there was a good selection of species displayed.

Blechnum articulatum This fern, which is found in NE Qld, displayed some bright red foliage for which it is renowned. (Gay Stagoll

2nd place).

B. brasiliense (Brazilian Tree Fern) This fern which comes from S America, was an excellent specimen with colourful new foliage. One problem with this fern is as they grow bigger there is a tendency for the caudex to become unsteady in the pot. (John Hodges - 1st place).

B. cartilageum (Gristle Fern) This fern is the only Victorian blechnum which is not dimorphic. Has good colour if grown in a high light situation.

B. contigeum This is an attractive fern from LHI where it grows in the mountain cloud mist zone as an epiphyte. (Gay Stagoll - 3rd place)

B. discolor This hardy fern from New Zealand is usually found in wet boggy ground.

B. filiforme This is an interesting climbing fern from New Zealand. It commences life as a terrestial with almost round pinnae. As it develops and begins to climb the pinnae change shape and become long and narrow. It also then becomes dimorphic developing long very thin fertile fronds. It will not become fertile whilst growing on the ground.

B. glandulosum

B. indicum (Swamp Water Fern) This swamp loving fern is found from Nth NSW to the top of Australia. It is one of the few Australian blechnums which is not dimorphic.

B. inflexum This fern is from Africa.

B. sp from New Caledonia.

B. nudum (Fishbone Water Fern) and B. nudum crested. B nudum is one of the most common ferns in eastern Australia where it grows in damp areas.

B. occidentale A tropical American fern which has become naturalised in Nth.Old

B. wattsii (Hard Water Fern) Another fern with good bronze colouring on the new foliage.
