Welcome to the Fern Society of Victoria. Please accept our apologies for the quality and late arrival of our first Newsletter. We have now elected a sub-committee to look after our Newsletter and Magazine, and hope to keep you up to date with our activities. It is proposed to issue a Newsletter monthly and a Magazine, twice a year with interesting articles on ferns, such as cultivation, spore-raising, descriptions and photographs of species and cultivars.

We welcome news items, or articles for our Newsletter and Magazine, so let us hear from you.

At our July meeting, I gave a talk on Fern Books, as a result we received many orders for books, that were discussed. For those interested, we will have the following books for sale at our next meeting at a considerable discount.

HINTS ON FERN GROWING

- Do not put them straight out in a fernery or garden at this time of year (September.)
- Try to assimilate humid glasshouse conditions for newly bought adiantum ferns, and use an atomiser spray at least once a day.
- Expect the plant to receive a certain amount of setback during its first season.
- Remember gas and oil heaters are more drying than electrical heaters.
- 5. Talk to your ferns and give them encouragement.
